As winter weather approaches we need to become more cautious of road conditions and keeping children safe. Our bus drivers need to plan accordingly when making adjustments for departure times if need be, so be sure to keep an eye on weather conditions and the notifications that come along with snowy or icecovered roads. Notifications of school delays or cancellations will be available to parents and students as soon as they can be transmitted through the Blackboard message system, so a text, e-mail

and call will be sent out. The school will try to make this decision as early as possible, but as you all are very aware, weather situations in our part of the country can change rapidly. Weather closing information is released to local radio and television stations immediately, as well, although we have no control over the time it takes for that information to get on the air. Handling multiple closings and cancellations accurately by media sources makes for a difficult situation.

Weather closings or cancellations are always made with the best

interests of our students in mind. We do understand that there are times when schools may be closing, but workplaces are not. That makes it difficult for parents on those days. Please keep in mind that at any time if you feel that you would rather keep your child home due to poor weather conditions you may do so. We want your children to be safe at all times. If your children drive themselves to school, urge them to be cautious and not hurry. Being a little late is not a problem on those winter days that warrant a little extra driving time.

Calling the school early will usually result in no information as we are busy out driving roads or calling people that can help us make a qualified decision on conditions in our district. Since the district is so large the weather and road conditions may differ significantly. Once the call has been made the media is alerted right away so people can plan for the day. If you are not on the calling system and would like to be please contact Natalie in the high school office.

Parents, the winter conditions always have the potential of getting a bus stuck or having a breakdown. The buses are monitored by radio and help is usually a few minutes away. However, in the event a bus fails to run the temperature can drop very quickly due to the lack of insulation. This is why it is important to ensure your child is dressed appropriately for the cold. Please help remind them that flip flops and shorts are not proper clothing for winter. It is also important that they are wearing a coat when riding the bus on those cold days. Thank you for your help ensuring your child is properly prepared for the weather conditions.

# Counselor's Corner - Mr. Loshbaugh

## SENIORS

November 7<sup>th</sup> is the regular deadline for the December 13<sup>th</sup> ACT test. Seniors, this is the last ACT test that will count for scholarships.

Seniors who know where they would like to attend should complete the application process to that school if they have not done so. This will allow you to apply for college specific scholarships.

Seniors are asked to continue working on their resumes. This requires going back and remembering all of your school activities, work experiences, and volunteer experiences in order to compile a professional resume. Students will be able to use these when applying for local scholarships beginning in January.

Reminder that students get two days during their Senior year to go and visit colleges, the military, etc. These days do count against your ten absence days a semester.

## Scholarships

Information about The Hagen Scholarship can be found at haganscholarships.org. The Purpose of the Hagan Scholarship is to provide each scholarship recipient with the opportunity to obtain a four year college education and graduate debt free. The preferred recipient of a Hagan Scholarship will be a high achieving and self-motivated student with traditional employment experience who aspires to obtain a college education in order to realize his or her full potential. Application deadline is November 15<sup>th</sup>.

The Townsend Scholarship is a local scholarship valued at \$16,000 plus \$1,200 for a personal computer. It is only for students at McCook and Southwest High Schools. Applications for this year's award are available in Mr. Loshbaugh's office. Deadline is March 7, 2015.

The University of Nebraska's Collegebound Nebraska guarantees that students who meet admissions requirements and who are awarded a federal Pell Grant can attend the University of Nebraska and pay no tuition. This year, approximately 6,700 students at the University of Nebraska -- almost a quarter of Nebraska undergraduates at the university -- meet the Collegebound Nebraska promise. Visit <u>collegeboundnebraska.com</u> to learn more.

Peru State College has four nursing program seats available through the Rural Health Opportunities Program. Application deadline is December 1<sup>st</sup>.

Twin Valleys Public Power District offers a scholarship each year to one student who is interested in becoming a lineman. The application process is quite easy; see Mr. Loshbaugh if you are interested. The deadline for applying is January 1, 2015.

Titan Machinery sponsors a scholarship to Central Community College's diesel technology program which pays all costs other than room and board. See Mr. Loshbaugh for the application, which is due by March 1, 2015.
